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Zoom Links

Zoom Ettiquette

Presentation Time: All presenters are alloted 12-15 minutes (for 4-person panels) and 15-18 minutes (for 3-person panels). We expect all presenters to adhere to these time limits and to be prepared to adapt their presentation as needed to account for technical glitches, etc. so the sessions can stay on time and provide adequate time for Q&A for all presenters.

Zoom Room Availability: All Zoom rooms will open 15 minutes before each session and admit presenters first to get set up. Moderators will wait to admit attendees until just a couple of minutes before the session starts. All rooms will close no later than 5 minutes after their allotted time to allow the next session to set up.

Video/Audio: We expect presenters will have their camera on while presenting and be prepared to share their screen as appropriate for sharing slide decks, etc. Given the challenges with showing clips on Zoom, we discourage the use of media. We strongly encourage attendees to have their cameras on as much as possible to communicate their attention to the presenter in a non-verbal fashion. When not speaking, we expect all attendees will mute their microphones.

- **3.** We encourage spirited debate about popular culture issues, pedagogy, theory, and other relevant topics, but we will not permit personal attacks on any attendees, presenters, or exhibitors.
- 4. Specifically, as a presenter and/or attendee of the SWPACA Salon,

You agree that you will not:

- act in a manner that is hateful or discriminatory based on race, gender, class, religion, nationality, ethnic or national origin, citizenship status, marital status, veteran status, disability, body type, sexual orientation, gender identity, education, or age, or in a manner that is otherwise objectionable;
- behave in a manner that is libelous or defamatory, or in a way that is otherwise threatening, abusive, violent, harassing, malicious, or harmful to any person or entity, or invasive of another's privacy;

Any attendee who witnesses or experiences a violation of this code is advised to undertake the following steps, within their comfort level and with a priority to safety.



However, in the event that the Executive Team becomes aware of any violations of this Code, the SWPACA will investigate and issue a warning if appropriate. Mission


